How to Light a Hanukkiah


Lighting the Hanukkiah (Chanukah menorah) is a beautiful mitzvah that brings light into our homes and reminds us of the miracles of Chanukah. Here's a simple guide to follow:

Preparation:

- 1. **The Hanukkiah**: Ensure you have a Hanukkiah with space for eight candles plus the shamash (helper candle).
- 2. Candles: You will need 44 candles for all eight nights of Chanukah.
- 3. **Placement**: Place the Hanukkiah by a window or a doorway to publicly display the mitzvah of Chanukah.
- 4. **Time**: Light the candles after nightfall, but, if necessary, they can be lit earlier or later to accommodate your schedule.

Steps to Light the Hanukkiah:

- 1. **Insert the Candles**: Place candles in the Hanukkiah from right to left, corresponding to the nights of Chanukah.
 - On the first night, insert one candle; on the second night, add a second candle to the left of the first, and so on.



- 3. **Recite the Blessings**: Before lighting, recite the blessings for Chanukah (see next page)
- 4. **Light the Candles**: Use the shamash to light the candles from left to right (newest candle first).
- 5. **Sing or Reflect**: After lighting, recite "Haneirot Hallalu" and sing traditional songs like "Maoz Tzur" or reflect on the meaning of the holiday.

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Additional Notes:

- The candles should burn for at least 30 minutes.
- It is traditional not to use the Hanukkiah candles for any other purpose (e.g., reading by their light).





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Before lighting the Hanukkiah

Blessed are You, our Living God, Sovereign of the universe, who did wonders for our ancestors in those days at this season.

On the first night add

Blessed are You, our Living God, Sovereign of the universe, who has kept us alive and supported us and brought us to this season.

After lighting the Hanukkiah

We kindle these lights to commemorate the wonders, the victories and the marvellous and consoling deeds which You performed for our ancestors through Your holy priests in those days at this season. During all the eight days of Hanukkah these lights are holy, and we are not permitted to make use of them, but only to see them in order to thank Your name for the wonders, the victories and the marvellous deeds.
